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Preface

In 1984, my pastor asked me to teach a new young adult Sunday School class that was to be started from the one in which Zannie and I were members. Little did I know that this would move me to a path of which I had never dreamed. I am sure those who left the comfort and great teaching to which they were accustomed to sit under my totally untrained and inexperienced teaching at times questioned their decisions.

My lack of skill and experience, however, not only caused me to learn how to teach more effectively—it also opened a door I would have never seen, let alone walked through, otherwise. After about a year of teaching and seeing our class grow, frustration began to well up inside of me. I knew there was more to learn about teaching and being a good Sunday School leader but I had no idea where to go beyond my limited, pre-internet research.

My frustration boiled over at times to my wife, Zannie. One day, as I was venting to her about the lack of training offered by our church leadership, she wisely made a suggestion from her Nominating Committee perspective: "Our Sunday School director is only filling in until we can find someone else. If you don't like the way they are doing it, why don't you do it yourself?" After giving it some prayer and thought, I agreed to take a position I knew absolutely nothing about—much less than I knew about being a teacher, at any rate.

I began reading everything I could get my hands on related to leadership and the specific responsibilities of a Sunday School director. I was introduced to some of our earliest Southern Baptist Sunday School heroes such as J. M. Frost, Arthur Flake, J. N. Barnett, and A. V. Washburn. Additionally, I had the opportunity to sit briefly under the training of Harry Piland a few years before his death.

I was introduced to and formed wonderful relationships with Wayne Poling, David Apple, Daniel Edmonds, Tim Holcomb, and Mark Miller, who I consider true mentors in my path into ministry. Men like Bill Taylor and Allan Taylor took the opportunity to open doors for me that I never could have opened on my own.

As my journey continued, I even had the opportunity to help plant a church in the Seattle area with my family. My pastor, Scott Brewer, took one of the greatest gambles of his life by appointing me as the bi-vocational Minister of Discipleship. This launched me into learning about home Bible study groups—or "Share Groups," as we called them.

As our time in Washington came to an end and we moved back to our home in Tennessee, God gave me a definitive call into full-time vocational ministry and nudged me to finish my degree in Christian Education from a local Bible college. From there, I expected churches to be standing in line to have me join their staff as a Minister of Education.

After a period of being humbled and allowing His timing to become my desire, we made a move to Alabama to join the staff of a great, growing new church. This stretched me tremendously. But when that chapter was over and a move to another new church took place, the adventure into home Bible study groups really took off.

In the pages that follow, you'll see the manual—in a slightly modified form—that I put together to help meet the needs of our home groups at that time.

That particular adventure served its specific purpose and came to an end. My present desire is that what I learned, and put on paper, will help you and your ministry.

Introduction

From a need within our own church, we started several Bible study groups in church members' homes. Alternative locations you might consider include restaurants, workplace break rooms, office spaces, and so on. A Bible study group can actually be held anywhere, as long as people have a desire to meet. Groups that meet in homes, however, face some particular issues that need to be acknowledged and dealt with before the group even begins.

In my case, our church needed to start home Bible study groups (Home Groups) for several demographics—those serving during our Sunday School time, those who had to work on Sundays, and even as outreach for friends, family members, and co-workers who would not attend activities on a church campus for whatever reason. Starting Home Groups also might be wise for those who have limited on-campus meeting space.

For whatever the reason you might need to start Home Groups, between these pages you will discover things I found to be helpful in guiding our groups; you, very likely, will need to tweak my suggestions to fit your own particular situation.

In dealing with Home Groups, you should learn much while understanding there will always be much yet to learn. As you progress in the growth of this ministry, I expect there will be changes, improvements, adaptations, and new ideas that come to light. Everyone in Home Group leadership should agree to use the current model chosen by your church leadership. The growth and health of your groups will depend on how well you and your leaders live out what is set before you.

"Hometown Local Church" (HLC) is the name of a fictitious church used here; however, the principles and guidelines are specific to the education/discipleship ministry of the wonderful church where I was serving at the time of this original writing. The denominational beliefs are not the focus of this book, but instead the focus is the steps that will help your particular church navigate the Home Group world.

My ultimate goal for this book is not to sell a million or even thousands of copies, although I would have no complaint about that. My goal is to help churches, staff, and volunteer leaders grow healthy groups which should, in turn, grow strong disciples and reach people for Christ.


